Mule Deer

An easy trick for telling Mule Deer from White Tails is to look for the black tip on a Mule Deer's tail and its big ears. Can you find flattened snow where a deer might have laid down to rest?



Raven

Raven are very smart birds. They have many different calls and can even mimic sounds. They have been known to call wolves over to kill a prey that they can then scavenge later.



Canadian Pacific Railway (CP Rail)

CP Rail has about 20,100 Km of track and has been traveling for over 140 years! Without the CP Rail, the historic town of Glenbow might not have existed.



Alberta Wild Rose Hips

A Wild Rosebush has no leaves in the winter but you can spot it by it's hips. Hips are the edible berries full of antioxidants. As a treat, children once sucked on frozen rose hips, rather like a popsicle.



Porcupine

A Porcupine's quills usually lay flat. They cannot shoot quills, instead, they stand up when threatened. You might spot a Porcupine up in a tree eating pine needles or bark.



Animal Tracks

Snow shows all kinds of tracks! Coyote tracks have an x shape between the pads, just like dogs tracks. Look for human footprints nearby to see if you are tracking a pet or wild dog.



Bow River

The Bow River's water comes from Bow Lake fed by the Bow Glacier. It is an important source of irrigation and drinking water. By protecting it's shores we can help protect our water supply.



Chimney Remnants

Glenbow Ranch has 3 chimneys from homesteads build over 100 years ago. In the early 1900's an industrial town named Glenbow was filled with jobs, families and sports. Can you spot what's left?
